- How does regional aviation view government requests for information?
  - → Regulatory compliance in response to criminal and terrorist offenses
  - → Understanding information request purpose visa requirements, prevention, detection, investigation and prosecution of crime and terrorist offenses
  - Civic duty safe and secure passage for travellers





- How does regional aviation see future organisation and governance of information exchange?
  - Adherence to international standards, EU SARP's
  - → Inter-state information request consistency
  - → Data request minimisation in line with GDPR
  - Immigration, customs and security working directly with DCS providers





- How would the proposed EU centralised 'router' fit in with regional DCS providers?
  - Regional carriers do not have direct contact with DCS providers as they are contracted by the handling agent (third party)
  - → The 'router' design and implementation must work with DCS providers if it is to achieve streamlined information exchange, increased efficiency, while considering cost factor mitigation



- Specific regional concerns.
  - → Errors in API
  - Member state information request inconsistency adds complexity and thus cost
  - → Regional airport DCS available
  - Security alert at check in or the boarding gate
  - → Member state capability to properly analyse API/PNR information for security purposes
  - → Transfer of passenger data securely to comply with GDPR
